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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

This past school year was another banner year for Latta High School.

Latta High School has been recognized in U.S. News and World Report in its ranking of "America's Best High Schools." Latta High School received recognition in the report as a bronze medal winner.

With the help of our students and parents, we continued a trend of strong performance on the Exit Exam. On HSAP, we had a 91.2% first attempt pass rate in English Language Arts and a 94.7% first attempt pass rate in Mathematics. Latta High School continues to be above the state average in the pass rate on all areas of the End-of-Course Test.

The number and kinds of scholarships awarded to Latta students has been a continuing encouragement. We have three Palmetto Scholars, twelve Life Scholarship recipients, and a number of students earning an assortment of other kinds of scholarships.

We were able to achieve these levels because of the efforts of an excellent teaching faculty, the support of our parents, the efforts of our students, and the trust that exists between the schools and the people of our community. The high expectations of the aforementioned groups have greatly enhanced our ability to compete academically.

While we have accomplished a great deal this past academic year, we look forward to the challenges of the 2009-2010 school year.
