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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Carver Bay High School (CBHS) is a comprehensive high school located in rural Georgetown County, South Carolina. Employment opportunities are limited, and the unemployment rate is high. Carvers Bay High School continues to be a leader in single-gender education. The school is in its second year of the Teachers Advancement Program (TAP) initiative and is committed to improving achievement for all students. The school's building construction and agricultural science programs are on the cutting edge by challenging our students with hands-on experience and providing them with lifeskills. Carvers Bay High School Education and Economic Development Act (EEDA) programs have been chosen to be a part of a four year longitudinal study through a grant from Clemson University.

The school's overriding challenge is to get an increasing number of students to meet readiness standards for both postsecondary education and the workplace by adopting a culture of high expectations through a more rigorous curriculum. To achieve this goal, four fundamental issues will be addressed:

To continue to upgrade the program of study so that every core subject is being taught at the post-secondary level, engaging and challenging students in a rigorous instructional program;

To create a climate of high expectations so that all students can perform at least at the proficiency level on state standards;

To develop a working plan where teachers can have collaborative planning time not only within the school but, also, with the feeder middle school; and

To continue to build district and community commitment and understanding for improvement efforts.
