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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Pelion High School students, teachers, parents and staff have worked hard and reached numerous milestones of academic and extra-curricular achievement this past year — including improving student attendance, reducing the number of disciplinary referrals and winning a Palmetto Silver Award. We are pleased with our progress, and we look forward to meeting the challenges and opportunities ahead.

During the 2008–2009 school year, our faculty was involved in staff development that included Dr. Ruby Payne's book, "Frameworks for Understanding Poverty." These sessions were led by our principal and assistant principal for instruction. After heightening our awareness, we began developing and refining strategies for addressing the educational needs of our students who face severe and ongoing financial challenges. As it turned out, this staff development was particularly relevant to our student population during the current economic downturn.

We also continued to emphasize cross-curricular literacy development consistent with our High Schools That Work plan.

Although PHS received the Palmetto Silver Award in 2008–2009 for strong test scores, we continue to face the perennial challenge of improving our graduation rate. To address the need, we have taken a number of steps including developing an APEX credit recovery and unit recovery program, which provides remedial assistance and additional opportunities for success. More than 150 students struggling in core academic classes required for graduation, such as English, mathematics and science, have recovered units or credits. By passing these core academic units in ninth grade, students stay on track to earn a high school diploma in four years, thereby increasing Pelion High's graduation rate.

Our students and coaches enjoyed many successes. PHS athletes had a 71 percent success rate, with 11 of 14 varsity teams qualifying for the playoffs.

In fine arts, the marching band received superior and/or excellent ratings at five music festivals and had 10 PHS students named to the Region 2 Honor Band. The PHS orchestra had three students named to the all-state orchestra, and Serenata received a silver rating at the Southern Star Music Festival in Atlanta, Georgia.

In other activities, the FFA Wildlife Management Team won the state competition for the eighth time in nine years. The FFA Soils Team won the region championship, and a PHS student won State Star Farmer, the highest FFA state-level award. In addition, the Pelion High FBLA had a two-time district and state winner of Accounting and Business Calculations awards.
