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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Seneca High School demonstrated "Excellence in Academics, Arts, and Athletics" during the 2008-2009 school year.

Seneca High School is very proud of the academic accomplishments of our students. In June, 223 seniors graduated from Seneca High School. Ten students received state academic diplomas. One senior received the prestigious National Merit Scholarship, two seniors were recognized as National Achievement Scholars, and two seniors received the prestigious Robert C. Byrd Scholarship. Sixteen seniors received Palmetto Fellowships and 85 seniors qualified for the Life Scholarship. Eighty-nine percent of the Class of 2009 earned the Platinum Honor Cord. The graduating class of 2009 received an all time high of over 4.5 million dollars in scholarships. Forty-four percent of the senior class members will attend a four year college, 34% will attend a two year college, 20% will enter the work force, and 2% will enter the military. SHS will be represented by the Class of 2009 at more than thirty-eight colleges and universities.

The Fine Arts Department continues to be recognized as one of the finest in the state. A SHS art student received the SDOC James M. Brown Art Scholarship. The band, choral, and strings programs successfully competed throughout the state. The Seneca High School Honors Chorale captured 3rd place in the AAA division at the South Carolina Music Educator's Choral Festival in Columbia. Twenty-two students were named to the SC All-State Chorus. One choral student was selected as the recipient of the SC Music Educator Memorial Scholarship. In addition, a SHS choral parent was selected to receive the SCMEA Friend of Music Education Award. Band, strings, and choral students participated in All-County programs.

Seneca High School's Mock Trial received several awards during the Regional Competition. In addition, the SHS Key Club was recognized for the first time at the Carolina's District Key Club Convention in Durham, NC as one of five chapters in North Carolina and South Carolina to be named a "Distinguished Club". Also, the Rachel's Challenge Program was expanded with Rachel's Legacy.

Seneca High athletics continue to excel. The Lady Cats Basketball team won the region and advanced to the third round of the AAA State Playoffs. The Boys Baseball team was District 2 Champions and advanced to the Upper State finals. In all, SHS Track and Field accounted for five state championships in the spring. Nine Bobcat teams participated in the playoffs. A SHS student won the State AAA Individual Girls' Golf Championship. A SHS student was also named the Gatorade SC Girls' Cross Country Runner of the Year. Seneca High School received the Palmetto Silver Award for Academic Achievement for 2008-2009. SHS is recognized as a Red Carpet School for demonstrating an environment that is open and inviting to parents and visitors. We are extremely proud of our school's accomplishments.
