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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Dreher High School continued its proud tradition of quality education and excellence in academics and the arts in the 2008-2009 school year. Faculty, parents, community, and students collaborated with Richland County School District One to publish our new mission statement and beliefs in order to continue our commitment of excellence as we serve our young people. Our year began with the proud announcement of recognition by Newsweek Magazine as One of "America's Top High Schools." The school was named as a Palmetto Silver Award winner and met the stringent federal Adequate Yearly Progress standards. We continued our Partnership in the High Schools That Work program as well as our commitment to the federal Smaller Communities grant programs by expanding our focus on literacy and developing our advisor/advisee program.

To date, the Class of 2009 has received over \$16.5 million in scholarship offerings. Dreher produced 9 AP Scholars with Distinction, 3 AP Scholars with Honor, 9 AP Scholars, 18 Palmetto Fellows, and 36 Richland One High School Scholars. The Academic Decathlon Team was state champion for the 8th consecutive year and placed 16th in the national competition with one gold medal winner. Our economics students won the state Economics Challenge. Our Math Team won the championships at the College of Charleston and Furman tournaments. Our new Robotics Team, fine arts students, Latin scholars, and FBLA members were all recognized at the state and regional level. Our teams produced four regional championships, three top ten state final rankings, two individual state champions, and five district players of the year. The tradition of service and community involvement was carried on by projects such as the MS Walk, Invisible Children Campaign, Harvest Hope, an ongoing African Relief effort, United Way fundraiser, National Honor Society tutorial, and many other initiatives.

This year, our dedicated staff members received many honors. We have 13 National Board-certified teachers. We are home to the 2009 Richland One Teacher of the Year and Classified Employee of the Year, S.C. Dance Association's Educator Of the Year, the AAA State Athletics Director of the Year, the 2008 Regional Teacher of the Year, an inductee in the 2008 National Track Coaches Hall of Fame, and four regional coaches of the year. All of our teachers continued their training in Academic Literacy.

As we settled into our second year in our grand new facility, the Dreher High School faculty and staff continued our commitment to partner with parents and community to provide all of our students with a learning environment that enriches academic, artistic, vocational, and personal growth. We continue our quest for excellence.
