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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Broome High School has experienced another extraordinary year of success. Academic excellence and data-driven decision making continued to be the primary focus for all instructional leaders and faculty at Broome High School. Teachers continued to use technology to deliver instruction and effectively engage students at all levels of learning.

Broome High School was named a bronze medalist in the December issue of U.S. News & World Report—America's Best High Schools. U.S. News & World Report—in collaboration with School Evaluation Services a K-12 data research and analysis business providing parents with education data—analyzed academic and enrollment data from more than 21,000 public high schools to find the very best across the country. These top schools were placed into gold, silver, bronze, or honorable mention categories. Broome High School was one of nineteen schools recognized in the state, and one of six in the upstate.

The Academic Reinforcement Center (ARC) continued to facilitate the academic growth and success for all students. In addition to being staffed during the school day, content area teachers are available in the ARC before and after school, providing students with multiple opportunities to receive assistance. While in the ARC, students can work on class work/homework, re-take tests, complete assigned NovaNet modules, and prepare for important assessments such as the ACT, SAT, HSAP, and/or SC EOCEP using various software programs.

Students distinguished themselves throughout the year. In 2008-2009, our seniors received a total of \$2,857,976 in scholarships. One hundred percent of our seniors passed HSAP. Sixty percent of our seniors participated and earned college credit through dual enrollment programs. Five culinary arts students placed FIRST in the South Carolina Prostart Student Invitational and then went on to compete and place in the National Prostart student competition in San Diego, California. A fire fighting student won the SC SkillsUSA competition for firefighting and will compete in the national completion in Kansas City, Missouri. The BHS Royal Regiment was awarded the Festival Rating of "Superior" at the 2008 South Carolina Upper State Marching Band Championships. This is the highest possible rating a band can receive at the SC Music Educators-sponsored event.

Our staff also received numerous awards. The SC Chapter of National School Public Relations Association recognized Broome for seven school level awards. Various staff members were selected to present at national conferences in the areas of literacy and data analysis for improving student achievement.

The emphasis on student excellence and achievement continues to be given top priority. Through interactive technology, the integration of reading and writing in all subject areas, and the detailed analysis of student achievement, we will continue to ensure that all students are successful.
