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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Spartanburg High School continued its relentless pursuit of academic excellence. The instructional program is synonymous with providing a firm foundation that colleges and universities across the nation desire. SHS continues to be annually recognized by "Newsweek" magazine as one of the top high schools in the country for its outstanding Advanced Placement program. It has been a record-breaking year for Spartanburg High School, with 97 College Board AP scholars, two Presidential Scholars (only two in the state of South Carolina), 3 Robert C Byrd Honor Scholarships, and merit scholarships totaling almost \$16 million over a four year college career, eclipsing the previous record by over \$6 million.

The Class of 2009 has distinguished itself with 15 seniors being recognized by the national merit or achievement competitions for being among the top scorers in the nation on the PSAT. Ten students went on to be finalists. Additionally, 137 seniors qualified to earn a \$5,000 LIFE scholarship. Thirty-six seniors were recognized as Palmetto Fellows Scholarship winners. Spartanburg High School is honored to have two Presidential Scholars chosen from among 2.8 million seniors nationwide. Twenty-two seniors received one the state's highest honors in being named SC Academic Honor recipients.

The Viking Academy was established and fully implemented for those students who were academically challenged. It provided a smaller learning environment, which proved to be successful in increasing our number of on-time graduates. An Advisor/Advisee mentoring program called STRIVE (Students and Teachers Reaching for and Investing in Vikings' Education) was developed this year to give students within the building a specific adult to go to for advisement and mentoring.

Our fine arts and athletic programs continued to excel and perform at a high level. Orchestra, band, and chorus received superior ratings at the state competitions. The South Carolina High School League recognized 64 seniors as athlete-scholars for having a 3.5 grade point ratio or higher. A total of 40 athletes were named to all region and/or all state teams.
