




READING – GRADE 8 (2007)

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REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

Colleton County High School was initially accredited under the auspices of Walterboro High School by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools in 1954 and has achieved 54 years of accredited educational service to the citizens of Colleton County. At CCHS, we are proud of the academic accomplishments of all of our students during the 2008-2009 school year. The Class of 2009 graduated 280 students with 249 State High School diplomas, 7 State Certificates, 14 Employability Certificates, and 11 Certificates of Attendance. This class included 4 Palmetto Fellows, 74 LIFE Scholarships, 9 HOPE scholarships, 1 Teaching Fellows, and a total scholarship amount of \$2,020,620. CCHS had 1 student with 11 years perfect attendance.

2008-09 CCHS students placed 4th in the State during the Knowledge Master competition, and the Academic Team placed 2nd in the USC Salkehatchie Bowl. The Math Team participated in the College of Charleston Math Meet in an all-day sprint and took third place. Two students qualified for the State Math Team for the national competition, and their team placed first in the nation in the B-Division.

In extracurricular activities, CCHS continues to shine, as the NJROTC Unit received the Unit Achievement Award for the 2nd consecutive year. This is the 12th consecutive year that the NJROTC Unit has been recognized as a top performer in the United States. Focusing on the arts, our choral department continues to provide outstanding entertainment during its annual winter musical and spring musical. This year's spring musical was Roger & Hamerstein's "The King and I". Our Band of Blue continued its tradition of excellence as the middle school and high school band members earned positions in the SCBDA Region 4 Honor band. The band also won the Outstanding Performance Award, which is the highest honor the Band Association gives at the state level for the thirteenth year in a row. The band was also participated in the 2008 Cherry Blossom Parade in Washington, DC. Cougar athletic teams proved competitive again this year. The girls' basketball team was the region champion for the third year in a row. The girls' softball coach, Rusty Adams, earned his 500 career victory with the softball team making the state playoffs. The high school remained active in the community by hosting the National Honor Society Blood Drive. We raised over \$800 for March of Dimes and also hosted Relay For Life, raising over \$10,000.

We continue to focus our efforts on providing a quality education for all our students. Our goal is to provide every student the support and resources needed to be successful. We would like to thank our teachers, parents and students who helped make the many successes of this year possible with their commitment to the cause of education in Colleton County. These initiatives and success stories are a testimony to our commitment to motivate a high number of students to accomplish their personal goal of high school graduation from an academically rigorous and challenging school, composed of caring, competent, and committed educators, employing data-driven instructional practices in order to prepare students for future success.
