




READING – GRADE 8 (2007)

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

We have had an outstanding year at Mid-Carolina High School, a school with a long-standing tradition of excellence. That tradition continued during the 2008-2009 school year.

The focus for school improvement has been, and will continue to be, student achievement. We were very pleased to see the percentage of students passing the math subtest of the HSAP go up significantly, from 84.8% in 2007 to 91% in 2008. We saw an increase of 22 points in SAT verbal scores from 2007 to 2008. All of our graduating seniors who were working toward a diploma passed the HSAP by the fall of 2008. In addition, 55% of our graduating class qualified for the LIFE scholarship. They received a total of \$1,787,198 in scholarships. Our graduation rate increased from 72.4% in 2007 to 81% in 2008. We also received the prestigious Palmetto Gold Award for our excellent improvement rating on the state report card.

MCHS is known for its strong athletic and fine arts programs. This year, the softball, baseball, soccer and girls' basketball teams all advanced to the state playoffs, and several students competed and placed at the state level in track. Our football team went on to make the playoffs for the second year in a row, making it to the second round. Our competition cheerleaders competed for a state title. For the third year in a row, our archery team placed first in the state competition and went on to compete at the national competition in Kentucky. The band competed in the state marching competition. Our chorus students competed in many state activities, including the USC, Furman, Columbia College and Region Honor Choirs and All-State Chorus. Our art students also had an extraordinary year, with two students being selected to attend the Governor's School for the Arts and Humanities summer or residential programs.

We will continue to strive toward engaging our students and reaching for the stars. It is important that we continue to develop strategies that will improve student achievement and use rigorous assessments tied to state standards. We are most proud of the role that our school plays in the community, and we definitely appreciate the support that we receive from parents and community members alike. We are also blessed with a dedicated faculty and staff, and their diligent efforts continue to foster improved student achievement at MCHS.
