


### READING – GRADE 8 (2007)

## REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

Pendergrass Fairwold School serves medically fragile, severely mentally and physically disabled students from ages 3 to 21 who require a structured educational environment that helps them maximize physical mobility, self-help skills, and life skills which will allow them to live in a community setting. We also provide services for students ages 18 to 21 who require significant supportive programming to transition from school to work or from school to independent living. All students receive educational and related services according to their Individual Education Plan (IEP) and are monitored for progress according to the guidelines of their IEP.

Our focus for students has been to build a foundation of required skills, to encourage, and to train students to participate in community partnerships where they learn to complete work tasks according to schedules and employer specifications. This has been accomplished by having our students participate in class and volunteer work where they learn to perform functional activities such as project assembly, packaging tasks, aluminum can and paper recycling, as well as greenhouse and cooking activities. Those students unable to participate in the tasks that require physical mobility are trained to attend to scheduled tasks and to use a variety of body language or assistive technology to interact with environmental stimuli or indicate their awareness of tasks and stimuli in their environment.

We strive to provide all of our students with the type of educational exposure that would allow them to score proficiently on SC-Alt testing by a continued emphasis on staff development for all employees, and by continuously scrutinizing our curriculum to target best practices and essential skills for our population. Although our test scores are statistically insignificant, we have noted continued improvements in the scores of the students who qualify to take SC-Alt testing.
