




READING – GRADE 8 (2007)

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

Each year, Richland Northeast High School's administration, faculty, and School Improvement Council utilize the annual State of South Carolina Report Card as one basis for assessing our strengths and addressing areas for potential improvement. We institute educational strategies that focus upon maximizing each child's potential within the context of the total school environment. Despite change year to year, one thing remains constant: RNE continues to provide students with the academic and social support they need in order to succeed in high school and beyond. We are proud of our successes in academics, athletics, and the arts.

Forty-three students received designation as AP scholars, including 6 Scholars with Honor and 17 Scholars with Distinction. RNE had 1 National Achievement Finalist, 3 National Merit Finalist, and 13 Palmetto Fellows. Thirty-one teachers have received National Board Certification. The class of 2009 received \$10,056,420 in merit-based scholarship offers. For the 24th consecutive year, 100% of Cosmetology students passed their state board examinations. For the 20th straight year, the RNHS Model United Nations team placed at the national conference. Richland Northeast High School was named a Red Carpet School for the 2006-2007 school year.

Our PCA Theatre Department was selected for the fifth time in nine years by the American High School Theatre Festival to represent the United States in performance at Edinburgh Fringe Festival in Scotland. The GAP Choir continues to receive national and regional awards and was the first local high school choir to perform for the former President Bill Clinton. For the 6th straight year, Richland Northeast High School has been named one of the top 1,000 schools in the nation by Newsweek magazine.

Our students excel at leadership through service learning, adopting more families than many other organizations in the Midland for Families Helping Families, collecting more than 18,000 can goods for God's Storehouse, and giving thousands of hours to volunteer efforts within the school and community. We're delighted with the many clear measures of our positive performance. We believe in our students, teachers, school and community.
