

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## REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

Saluda High School is dedicated to providing students with the best possible opportunity to receive an excellent education. We believe in holding all students and staff to high standards and fostering an environment in which everyone can be successful. The 2008 – 2009 school year has been another great year for the students, faculty and staff of Saluda High School.

Academically, we continue our trend of overall improvement. Our preliminary score reports on our End of Course (EOC) examinations indicate gains in United States History and math. We are anxiously awaiting our final scores for the current year on the EOC examinations and HSAP. We attribute our academic success to our continuing programs of staff development, the continued implementation of Academy Time, and the hard work of our students, faculty, and support staff. This year, we began implementing professional learning communities, where teachers collaborate to focus on student learning. Our district has provided us with Testview, a data base that allows teachers easy access to student information such as test scores, grades in all courses, course history, and demographic information so teachers can make informed decisions regarding the instruction of individual students.

In addition to the achievements of our underclassmen, our senior class as a group was awarded over \$1,700,000 in scholarships. This was an outstanding accomplishment for our senior class. Four students received the President's Award for Educational Excellence and another received the President's Award for Educational Achievement. Two seniors received Palmetto Fellows Scholarships.

Once again, our athletic teams, clubs, and organizations excelled on the regional and state levels. We had two athletes sign to participate in athletics at the collegiate level. In fall sports, our girl's tennis, volleyball, boy's basketball, girl's basketball, and our boy's and girl's cross country teams all advanced to the state playoffs. In the spring, our softball team, golf team, boy's and girl's track, and boy's tennis teams advanced to the state playoffs. Our boy's tennis team had the best season in school history and made it to the second round of the state playoffs. In all, eleven out of fourteen of our athletic teams made it to the playoffs.

A team from our Health Occupations Students of America organization once again qualified to compete in the national competition. One of our art students won first in the nation in the National Wild Turkey Federation art contest. Our Future Farmers of America (FFA) tool identification team won first place in the regional competition. Our FFA chapter was recognized as a Gold Emblem Chapter and will be recognized at the National FFA Convention in October.

This past year has been a very exciting year to be a part of the Saluda High School family. We pledge to build on the success we had this year and continue to improve in the months and years to come.

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
