


PASS PERFORMANCE

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

Paul Knox Middle School students experienced a rewarding and exciting school year. Our faculty, staff and students experienced a great deal of success in academics, the arts, athletics and various service learning activities.

Thirty-two students were recognized as South Carolina Junior Scholars and qualified to participate in the Duke TIP program. Twenty female students participated in the G.I.S.E. Program (Girls Interested in Science and Engineering). Our Future Business Leaders Association participated in the state level competitions in Charleston. Seven of our band students were selected for the Regional Band. Our band won a superior rating in the concert band competition. Our sixth grade students participated in ECOTALK which is sponsored by the Savannah River Ecology Lab's Outreach Program. The North Augusta Arts Council awarded three of our students cash prizes for their entries in the poster contest. One of these students competed in the regional contest.

Mrs. Gaye Pappas voted our Teacher of the Year, and she was named the Teacher of the Year for the Aiken County School District. She also received a \$500 grant from Public Education Partners which was used to fund a trip to Charleston for her students with learning disabilities. Mrs. Helen Richard was nominated by the Office of Career and Technology Education for the Barbara H. James Award for Outstanding Contributions to Career and Technology Education as the Career Specialist of the Year. She also received grants totaling \$4,000 from SHAW AREVA MOX Services @ SRS and Walmart to fund our Lunch and Learn Program. Mrs. Tiffinni Vining received a \$2160 grant from DHEC and the office of Solid Waste Reduction and Recycling. Mrs. Lisa Newman received an Excellence-in-Teaching grant in the amount of \$500 from the Washington Savannah River Company, a \$2,500 grant from the Food Lion Charitable Foundation, and she has been selected to attend the 2009 Science P.L.U.S. Institute at Roper Mountain Science Center. Mrs. Rhonda Kropp received a \$200 grant from the Phi Chapter of Delta Kappa Gamma.

The School Improvement Council (SIC) held its seventh annual Transition Fair. The fair provide rising sixth graders and their parents an opportunity to meet teachers, administrators, get helpful information and tour the school. Students and parents also were given the opportunity to participate in the Family Connections Awareness Program.

Paul Knox Middle School is fortunate to have a highly qualified faculty, staff and supportive community. Together, with our SIC, PTA, and parental involvement, Paul Knox Middle School can achieve its goals.
