
Our School Middle Schools with Students Like Ours Middle schools statewide






READING – GRADE 8 (2007)

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

This has been another exciting and successful year at Johnsonville Middle School. All the credit goes to our students, faculty, staff, and parents who have established and attained impressive goals with tremendous enthusiasm. Our students' creativity and academic excellence have resulted in awards and recognition at various events throughout the year.

JMS had eight eighth-grade students to qualify as Junior Scholars. The Mock Trial Team won its fifth regional competition and advanced to participate in the state competition, in which we finished in third place. Several competitors won special recognition at both the regional and state level. JMS had two students selected to attend a Young Writer's workshop. Eight seventh-grade Gifted and Talented Art students had their work displayed at the Drs. Bruce and Lee Foundation Library in Florence.

At the state Junior Beta Club convention, JMS had many successes. Our students placed first in sculpture, woodwork, and Science, second in the Arts and Craft Sweepstakes, and third place in jewelry, math division 1, and Songfest. One student ran for the office of state president. Our Academic Challenge Team completed another undefeated season. The team also captured its second straight Pee Dee Regional Tournament Division 2 Championship. Two students were selected to the all region team.

JMS demonstrates excellent citizenship through various service projects sponsored by the Student Council, Jr. Beta Club, Jr. Crusaders, and Fellowship of Christian Athletes. The Jr. Crusaders donated money to Harvest Home Food Bank. The Jr. Crusaders and FCA raised money for the Children's Miracle Network. The student council collected over 900 food items which were donated to Caring and Sharing. They also sponsored the Angel Tree, which benefits the Florence County Disabilities and Special Needs Organization. The Jr. Beta Club sold tee shirts to buy a section of rain forest in Madagascar. Finally, the Jr. Beta Club and the student council raised 1,500 dollars for the American Red Cross through the Hero's campaign during the month of March. Other events hosted by JMS include a Grandparent's Day luncheon, several community meetings, a Veteran's Day Luncheon, a Parent's Day luncheon, and the MMGW TAV visit.

JMS uses a variety of available technology, including MAP testing, SMART Boards, a CCC Lab, JMS website, Flash News, a STAR lab, and a teacher website.

JMS is currently implementing Making Middle Grades Work (MMGW). This is a concerted effort involving all stakeholders to improve instruction in the middle school in order to prepare our students for the high school. Our teachers continue to strive to improve themselves professionally in a variety of ways.

Through all stakeholders working together, we have achieved many of the goals that were established for this year.
