


Our School Middle Schools with Students Like Ours Middle schools statewide





REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

South Middle School continued to work towards providing our students with the best educational opportunities during the 2008-2009 school year. The following programs or initiatives were implemented this year: WSMS Studio Expanded – The broadcasting studio expanded this year. The morning news program was completely student directed and created. It expanded even further this year with a video program produced exclusively for our rising sixth-grade orientation; Fitness Challenge – Teachers and students have embraced fitness. Teachers participated in The Biggest Loser program while students walked their way to health through a district grant providing them with pedometers; Technology – Our focus on technology continued to grow. SMART Boards were installed in the remaining classrooms, and teachers were offered the opportunity to participate in additional district-provided technology training; and SMS Literary Magazine – A literary magazine was published highlighting student artwork and creative writing. South's students continued to excel in academics throughout the year. Twelve eighth-graders were selected as Junior Scholars, twelve students were recognized in the annual Celebration of Excellence, three seventh-graders were selected as Duke TIP Scholars, a sixth-grader won first place in the district Science Fair, a seventh-grade student had her Favorite Teacher essay published, seven teachers/administrators presented at the South Carolina Middle School Conference, seventy-five students were inducted into the National Honor Society, fifteen teachers worked on GT endorsement, and our girls' basketball team had an undefeated season. Our arts program also continued to flourish with our band and chorus once again being recognized with many accolades that included excellent and superior ratings at solo and ensemble events. Several of our art students also received awards at the local county art show. We continued to focus attention on implementing the comprehensive framework associated with Making Middle Grades Work. Two teachers also received National Board Certification. SMS could not have accomplished so much without the help and support of our parents and community. The PTO and School Improvement Council continue to help ensure that our students receive the best educational opportunities possible.
