Report of Director and School Improvement Council

During the 2009-2010 school year, Strom Thurmond Career Center's faculty and staff provided career and technology training to approximately 75% of the high school students in the Edgefield School District. Students were able to choose from a wide-variety of courses, including agricultural science and technology, horticulture, turf and lawn management, automotive technology, carpentry, welding technology, drafting, family and consumer science, business, marketing, and health science technology. Many students were able to enroll in several of these courses due to the flexibility of the A/B block scheduling.

Career and technology students received leadership training through their participation in clubs and organizations. Many of these students competed in district, state, and national competitive events related to their chosen career and technology training. Several of the Career Center students placed in state competitive events. These students are to be commended for their excellent performance.

We were able to secure state and federal funding to purchase additional equipment for carpentry, automotive mechanics, horticulture, turf and lawn management, welding, and business. Representatives of local business and industry support our programs as they serve on school improvement committees and volunteer to assist us in direct instruction of our students. We are very fortunate to have a very positive working relationship with local business and industry.

All high school students in the Edgefield School District are given an opportunity to explore a variety of career options with full-access to all career and technology programs offered by the Strom Thurmond Career Center. Students are also allowed to enroll in courses offered by the local technical institutions through dual-credit programs. We feel that our students are fully prepared to enter the workforce or continue their education when they complete our program.
