

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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Dear Beaufort Elementary Community,

The 2009-2010 school year was an exciting time to be at Beaufort Elementary School. The staff continued to spend time analyzing student achievement data, and we used this information to plan more effectively. We identified specific student-achievement challenges in the following subgroups: disabled ELA and math and African American math. In order to narrow and close each specified subgroup gap, Beaufort Elementary School has extended the EveryDay Mathematics program to Pre-Kindergarten; implemented the Voyager Passport Reading and VMath intervention programs for struggling students; implemented the Lexile-based Scholastic Reading Counts program; implemented an afterschool Academic Enrichment Program for selected students in grades 3 through 5; and increased the amount of literacy and mathematics instructional time.

Many wonderful things have been happening at Beaufort Elementary: impressive results in our MAP scores; adding an additional 1st and 5th grade class on the tenth day of school; adding 5th grade to AMES; successful fundraising: cookie dough, Book Fair, Exxon Mobile Grant, and spirit shirt; the only school who has community garden plots; an afterschool enrichment program that provides intense intervention; an afterschool strings and drumming program; implementing a school leadership team; literacy teachers who provide small-group instruction; classroom guidance lessons; several community service projects: Salvation Army Food Drive, Jump Rope for Heart, Relay for Life, Pennies for Patients, Hope for Haiti; student membership increase of over 200 plus students; Mildred Glover, BES Assistant Principal, author of Buddy Heads for Home; awarded accreditation with the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

We are excited about these and other improvements which will make 2010-2011 another great year.
