

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## Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

We were very proud and excited to receive the "Red Carpet Award" for 2009-2010. This is due to the conscious efforts of our staff, parents, and community members working together to provide a comprehensive education for our students. For the first time in five years, all Okatie Owls were taught inside of the building. We welcomed over 100 newly-zoned students from Bluffton and MC Riley Elementary Schools. Our new families have transitioned smoothly, and our current enrollment is 522. At the start of this year, all schools in Beaufort County moved to one traditional calendar. This helped reduce costs for facilities and provided common remediation times at all schools, with the implementation of Extended Learning Time.

Prior to the start of this year, each instructional space was outfitted with an interactive Promethean Board. Okatie students and staff continue to focus their attention on becoming more health conscious this year. We held our 2nd Annual Health Fair, with over 20 community agencies participating. A school-lunch committee was formed to make recommendations for the cafeteria lunch menus. The number of students and staff involved in the Running Club has doubled, and we held the 2nd Annual "Foot Flight" in May of last year, with Congressman Tom Davis attending. Helen Goodman was awarded the Eat Smart grant. Our new homework policy requires all students to include a half hour of daily physical activity to promote lifelong healthy habits. Students are responsible for logging their activity in a journal. We used miles logged at home and school on our way to DisneyLand, back home, and then to Vancouver, totaling 5,294 miles for our students!

Laura Phillips, Literacy Coach, was awarded the Sun City Solheim Cup grant again this year so that she can continue adding books to our W.H.O.O.S. Reading library. Dr. Scott and Mrs. Cannon continued to promote and oversee our recycling program. Our paper products are picked up weekly, and we continue to participate in Hargray's telephone-book recycling initiative. Our cardboard and plastics are separated by fourth grade students and taken to the Beaufort County recycling center for disposal while our cans are donated to the South Carolina Burn Foundation. Congratulations to Dr. Jorja Scott for being our teacher of the year and for earning her doctorate degree in leadership this year. Also, congratulations to Jennifer Helms, support staff of the year and first year as our computer instructor. As well as a special thank you to Loretta Tabor, volunteer of the year. She has worked with our students for the past five years.

Okatie students are very busy with a variety of activities before and after school, including baton, band, chorus, strings, cheerleading, morning math, Early Birds, running club, Gifted and Talented Art, Young Astronauts, and our brand new robotics club.

Last year, South Carolina replaced the PACT test given to third through eighth grade students over a two week period in May with the PASS test. PASS was administered to the same group of students over a total of six school days. The written portion of PASS was given to students over two consecutive days in March, while the remaining multiple choice portion of the PASS test was given during four days in May. Based on our PASS scores, Okatie Elementary School made Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) for the first time in five years! We are very proud of our students' and staff's strong progress, concerted effort, and focus on learning.

Okatie Elementary School owes its success to its staff, students, parents, and community members who volunteer their time so freely. The PTO provides multiple parent/student events, including Bingo, Muffins for Moms, Donuts for Dads, WINGS Celebrations, and Craft Fair. Hats off to Elizabeth Goodwin, Dr. Stinson, and Zeke Greco for their leadership and coordination of the 5th graders' outstanding performance of Seussical and
