
PASS PERFORMANCE

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

"Around the World in 180 Days"...what an educational trip we took this year at North Elementary! This year's writing theme, "What a Wonderful World," opened our school year with a field day based on games from around the world. Literature circles in grades 2-5 were expanded to enhance reading instruction. Over \$25,000 was used to purchase leveled readers, Readers' Theatre collections, and National Geographic magazines to build our k-5 literacy lab. Titles were selected by students and teachers in order to ensure continued instruction through quality literature that is of high interest to our students as well as meeting curriculum standards.

ClassWorks continues to support instruction by providing individual computer-based lessons in ELA and Math correlated to each student's MAP score. Based on PASS data, North Elementary was chosen as one of the top three Title I Distinguished Schools in South Carolina for Closing the Achievement Gap. Through the use of Corrective Reading, Reading Mastery and LEAP our students have small group time to work on specific reading skills that they need. MPASS math instruction provides students the opportunity to learn math skills in a small group environment. Through differentiating instruction and dedication, our teachers excel at meeting each learner where they are ready to learn. In the areas of ELA, writing, and social studies, an average of 80% of our students met or exceeded grade level standards on PASS testing. The number of students qualifying for and attending the Accelerated Reader celebration was higher than ever this year. In the fall, over 200 students traveled to the Recreation Department and Crown Cinema. In the spring, 275 students enjoyed a performance by Mad Science of Charlotte. This year, all our classes ventured out into the world around us. Field trips included the second grade walking tour of downtown Lancaster where they visited City Hall, the Police and Fire Departments, L & C Railroad, and many other historical sites. TMD enjoyed a fishing trip, visit to the strawberry patch and monthly outings to support our school-wide recycling program, in which they take the lead. Third grade travelled to Cotton Hills Farm. Fifth grade enjoyed the annual three-day, two-night Camp Thunderbird trip where they explored and learned about the importance of nature and preserving the world around us. Fourth grade's annual Myrtle Beach trip made a stop at the Dixie Stampede as well as Myrtle Beach State Park. First grade travelled to Cotton Hills Farm. Our fifth grade entertained us with a musical performance of December 'Round the World', where we learned about different cultural winter celebrations. In the spring, our fourth grade students' performance of Children of the World gave us perspective into the lives of children from across the globe. Although economic concerns continue to be an issue, service to others is still at the forefront of our school community. Our school raised over \$5,000 for Lancaster County's Relay for Life, \$2,200 for the Bordmer school in Haiti, participated in our annual HOPE canned food drive, and provided backpacks that contained seven nutritional meals for students in need. We appreciate the continued support of our PTA, SIC, volunteers, and mentors! We value the family relationships we have and know that because of our collective efforts our world here at North continues to be a great place to learn!
