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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

As a result of dedication and hard work by many stakeholders, Mauldin High School created a culture of collaboration, which led to a highly successful 2009-2010 school year both academically and athletically. Mauldin High was recognized once again by Newsweek magazine as one of the top public high schools.

Academically, Mauldin High School continues a tradition of excellence. The class of 2010 received scholarships totaling over \$15 million. Three students were awarded ROTC scholarships and two were recognized with military appointments. These prestigious awards included an appointment to West Point and an appointment to the Naval Academy. Twenty-nine students were named Palmetto Fellows, and twenty-two students graduated with South Carolina Academic Honors. Among these students was the valedictorian who was also named a Greenville County School Student of the Year for getting a perfect score of 2400 on the SAT. In 2010, more than six hundred AP exams were taken by Mauldin High students. Our strong academic program is supported by a dedicated staff that includes guidance and career specialists who met with each student individually to create a graduation plan this year. Students were provided job shadowing opportunities throughout the years and guest speakers were encouraged in all disciplines. Our Teacher Cadets had career-exploratory opportunities and participated in several leadership workshops. Service Learning students provided over 7,000 hours of service in our community. One of these students was named the Big Brother – Big Sister of the Year for Greenville County Schools. The Future Business Leaders of America Club was re-established at the beginning of the school year, and the students provided computer workshops to senior citizens in the community. During our annual Spirit Week, the Student Council led the student body in raising over \$200,000 for Pendleton Place Children's Home. The Robotics team was once again recognized for their outstanding abilities and their attention to safety.

In athletics, the Girls Swim Team and the Softball Team won 2009-2010 state Championships. Girls Tennis and Girls Soccer were State Runners-Up. Additionally, seven other athletic teams won region championships. Twenty-five student athletes signed to play college athletics in the fall of 2010. Six coaches received regional, state, and national coaches of the year awards, and eighty-eight student athletes received regional and state accolades.

The Mauldin High community is an integral part of the school's success. Our PTSA volunteers logged over 55,000 volunteer hours for the school year. On any given day in 2009-2010, Mauldin had at least fifteen volunteers. The Mauldin High School SIC initiative once again received a \$2,500 grant from State Farm Insurance Company. The Council's vision for this year involved creating a spirit of oneness and unity among its students, as well as between the school and the community. We continue to raise the bar and set goals that challenge the students, faculty, and community to meet high academic and moral standards. This shared vision is what made Mauldin High School successful in 2009-2010.
