


## PASS PERFORMANCE

## REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

During the 2009-2010 academic year Schofield Middle School offered a rigorous and challenging program that included all core subjects, many exploratory options, as well as French, Spanish, and German. We had many outstanding achievements, including twenty-four SC Junior Scholars, five Duke TIP Qualifiers, the repeating Junior Varsity Champion of the South Carolina Braille Challenge Competition, one winner in the Aiken 175th Anniversary Writing Contest, two winners at the Morris Museum's Combining Voices Competition, two students recognized by the Aiken Character First Celebration, one winner in the CSRA Black History Writing Contest, the most middle school winners at the Aiken County Literary Festival, 2nd Place at CSRA Eco Meet, 3rd place in the district Math Counts Team Competition, 2nd place in the district Academic Team Competition, and 3rd place in county Volleyball. We were County Champs in Football, Boys' Basketball, Girls' Basketball, and Golf. The Schofield music programs were also very successful. Festival Band earned Superior ratings at USCA and Carowinds competitions. There were 9 students selected for Region Band, 17 students chosen for County Band, and 24 Superior ratings earned at solo and ensemble. The Schofield Strings groups and the SMS Chorus performed at school and community events. A sixth grade strings student won a contest to play with the Augusta Symphony. Three chorus students participated in the South Carolina Middle School Honors Choir, and 7th and 8th grade chorus students earned an excellent rating at judging competition.

As the first Green Steps school in Aiken County, we continued our school-wide recycling program and maintained blue bird trails. We were the pilot school for collaborative effort between Aiken County Schools and the Aiken County Manufacturing Committee. Through this partnership, industry partners implemented a lunch buddy program, served as guest instructors, initiated manufacturing projects, and participated in a school-wide career day. Marlo Wright, a guidance counselor, was recognized by the SC Department of Education as a McKinney-Vento Education Program winner. Our service learning group led student participation on 10 projects that included a Breast Cancer Awareness Tea, Marine Corp Toys for Tots Drive, Pennies for Patients Drive, Holiday Mail for Heroes Program for the Red Cross, and Valentines for Veterans Project. Our Jr. Beta Club sent treats to the troops in Iraq and Afghanistan, made door ornaments for senior citizens, and collaborated with the French I students to send care packages to Haiti. Each morning students recited the character counts pledge. Words and colors of character were posted throughout the school, and students showed their support and spirit by wearing designated colors on Thursdays. To improve the success of all students, additional emphasis was placed on reading across the curriculum. Teachers successfully utilized reading strategies within each of their subject areas. The PTO sponsored several fundraisers including the Ram Walk which raised over \$5,000.00 for technology and a new portable stage. Our Title I/School Improvement Council was involved in many activities and made monthly recommendations. As one can see, this year the talent and hard work of Schofield students and staff were exemplary!

Schofield Middle has a proud past and a promising future!
