


PASS PERFORMANCE

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REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

The 2009-2010 school year was another very exciting one at Springfield Middle School. Our faculty, staff, students, and parent organizations experienced a great deal of success in academics, the arts, athletics, and various service-learning projects during the school year. Some of our year's successes are listed below.

- Silver Award Winner for Student Achievement with an EXCELLENT Absolute Performance Rating and a GOOD Improvement Rating.
- Gold Award Winner for closing the achievement gap based on academic gains made by students who fall into four subgroups of historically low-achieving students.
- Partner School with Winthrop University through a grant called NetSCOPE. Allows us to help train future teachers through Winthrop University and the teacher internship.
- SMS was named a Red Carpet School for our customer service and parent-friendly atmosphere by the State Department of Education.
- 2010 State Middle School Archery Champions, Ranked 40th in the nation.
- Middle School Mock Trial Team – 2009 Piedmont Regional Winner – Third in the state.
- Beta Club – 61 members – 475 hours of community service – Numerous donations – \$8,200 in donations collected from students and staff and given to charities.
- 53 Eighth Graders designated as Junior Scholars.
- 3 All State Band Members, 35 All Region Band Members, 45 All County Members.
- Band received a Superior Rating at the State Concert Festival and a trip to Orlando-STARs Concert Festival.
- Artist-in-Residence and 8th grade students created a tile collection to be displayed.
- Art – eight students received awards from the Arts Council of York County – 10 art students' designs were chosen by the Comporium Directory Cover Contest.
- Our students were involved in many fundraising ventures such as the Juvenile Diabetes Walk and Pasta for Patients.
- Lego Robotics won 1st place Teamwork Award at the Aiken Regional Competition.
- Boys' Soccer Team was conference champions.
- Cheerleaders won first place in three areas at the UCA Cheerleading Camp.
- The Nation Ford Chapter of DAR sponsored the DAR American History Essay Contest. Middle schools from Fort Mill, Indian Land, and other surrounding areas competed. A Springfield Middle School student won this contest.

The primary challenges for Springfield Middle School and the Fort Mill School District are funding and growth. We will downsize in 2010-2011, with the shifting of part of our attendance area to Fort Mill Middle. We will not use mobile units at that time. Due to lack of funding, we will have three fewer classroom teachers and class sizes will grow as students continue to move to our area. After losing our reading specialist for this school year, we will lose our math specialist for the coming school year. Our teachers will have to do more with less, but we are ready for this challenge.

Our year was packed with many successes and challenges, as we attempted to provide the best education possible for our students. With the continued support of our parents, our school will strive to provide the best education possible for our students.
