



REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

Swansea Primary School (SPS) serves approximately 400 students in preschool through grade two. Staff at SPS is committed to improving the educational environment for our young children. In this effort, grade-level teams met collaboratively once a week as a part of our Response-to-Intervention process, allowing time for teachers to work in partnership as they planned interventions for students whose progress indicated that additional time and support were needed to accelerate progress. The addition of a collaborative planning time for child development teachers afforded those teachers opportunities to provide interventions for the school's youngest students. The school's literacy coach, school counselor, principal, and teachers continued to build capacity to focus on student learning which, for the 2009-10 school year, included behavioral interventions as well as academic interventions. The addition of All Kinds of Mind training and the neurodevelopmental constructs added a new dimension for identifying areas of need and applicable interventions.

Swansea Primary School strives to be a community school by involving parents in decision-making. School-wide opportunities for parent and community involvement for the 2009-2010 school year included the Parent-Teacher Organization (PTO), Promoting Achievement, Learning, Success (PALS) program, and School Improvement Council. The PTO supported classroom libraries for teachers by purchasing books for each teacher's collection. They hosted a private performance by Mr. Al for students. PALS sponsored monthly parenting meetings, in conjunction with the district's family literacy program that focused on ways for parents to be more actively involved in the education of their children. PALS had over a 100 percent growth in their program for the 2009-10 school year. The School Improvement Council was actively involved in Title One planning meetings.

Swansea Primary School entered its last year of existence for the 2009-2010 school year. Preschool through 5K will move to the new Lexington Four Early Childhood Center (ECC) in August 2010. In preparation for the opening of the ECC, seventeen early childhood teachers began Montessori training through Lander University. Courses were offered on-site at Swansea Primary School. This partnership between Lexington Four and Lander University is an integral step in offering public school choice to students of Lexington Four. Swansea Primary School concluded 35 years of serving the community by focusing on student learning that was enhanced by high-quality staff development and a commitment to providing students the opportunity to advance to the highest levels of learning.
