Percent of Student PASS Records Matched for Purpose of Computing Growth Rating



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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Pee Dee Elementary earned Exemplar recognition from the state department for our efforts in being a Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS) school. The students will tell you that safety is a number one priority and learning follows. Our Bullying Prevention Committee continued to put supports into place including conflict resolution work with "bully busters". Students at Pee Dee Elementary do the 3 R's : Recognize, Refuse and Report helping to make safety everyone's number one.

Technology advancements continued with short arm projector installation, digital white boards in every room, additional personal response clickers and document cameras. Students, staff and community enjoyed the student-led Live Hive news each morning. Digital announcements were in view on our flat screen TVs throughout the building. Our Cyber Café remained fully operational as students continued to grow in their use of technology as a tool for learning.

Our reading core program, Imagine It!, was added to third grade and will soon be in all grades. Teachers and paraprofessionals poured a tremendous amount of labor into differentiating work to meet students' needs in all academic areas. Science and Social Studies notebooks enhanced learning as written reflection became a daily part of understanding standards. Mathematic work received extra planning, consultation and review as we found new ways to strengthen our instruction. Several models of math support began in January and yielded successful results. Many students benefitted from individual schedules to meet their academic needs.

Parental involvement was at an all time high at Pee Dee Elementary! During Goodies for Grandparents, Pastries for Parents, Thanksgiving Feast, Veteran's Day Program plus more we were filled and overflowing. New this year were our Family Math Nights. What a great time we had playing math games that connected to the classroom and sending the supplies home for the parents to continue to play! Once again, our volunteers, members of our community (Good News Club) and parents helped us out and made a difference. Preschool story hour and our library circulation increased. Our School Improvement Council and our PTO provided many hours of dedicated service. Buzzpower, our 21st Century Community Learning Center, continued this year. Students were tutored throughout the week and had opportunities for a variety of enrichment activities after school.

We are growing! We are moving upward! We are being more intentional and strategic than ever with learning opportunities! We've had the strongest year ever in our hive! Thank you to all.
