


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## REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

Lee Central High School is striving to excel in all aspects of the school program. Our motto is "The Pursuit for Academic Excellence has No End - We are Destined for Success." Lee Central is proud of its accomplishments and acknowledgements. The graduating class received over 3.4 million dollars in scholarship offers with 43 seniors receiving LIFE Scholarships. Thirty Students (9th to 12th) were selected to participate in the Clemson Biology Merit Exam. Fifteen students received twelve college credits from Central Carolina College as a part of Lee Central High Schools Middle College Program. Thirty-three students from LCHS attended the South Carolina Service Learning Conference held at Midlands Technical College (Airport Campus). Two LCHS students were selected to serve as delegates for Palmetto Girls State at Presbyterian College. Twenty-one students received awards from the Columbia Urban League. 32 students scored 1000 and/or above on the SAT or the equivalent on the ACT. A LCHS student was the recipient of The Wendy's Heisman Award and The SAFE Federal Credit Union Scholarship. LCHS Junior Scholars were recognized by the following colleges/universities: College of Charleston, Columbia College, Newberry College, Coker College, Furman University, and Erskine College. One student was selected as an USC Aiken scholar. Three hundred plus students received awards at our Annual Academic Awards Banquet.

As part of the High Schools That Work initiative, Lee Central High School implemented a comprehensive system of extra help for students. All teachers provided tutorials. Students also utilized APEX Learning for course mastery as well as credit recovery for attendance.

Lee Central High School continues to enjoy outstanding success in extra-curricular activities. LCHS JROTC obtained "Honor Unit with Distinction" status as a result of the Formal Inspection by US Army Cadet Command. Inspectors made note of the level of knowledge of the JROTC curriculum displayed by cadets. Cadets scored 98 percent in this area, the highest percentage for any of the inspection areas. Two athletes were selected as All Region IV Class AA Players. Three athletes were selected Region IV All-Conference Players. Fifteen Football Players were selected as All Conference Football Players. LCHS men's and women's basketball teams were the Region IV AA Champions.

We recognize that all of our stakeholders are a key component to the success of Lee Central High School. Parents, community members, ministerial, and business partners participated in the PTO, School Improvement Council, and various booster clubs. The Guidance Department, Curriculum Leadership Team, and administrators coordinated several programs including, but not limited to parent coffees, open house, and financial aid workshops, which increased parental involvement.
