Percent of Student PASS Records Matched for Purpose of Computing Growth Rating



Charleston School of the Arts takes pleasure in announcing, that once again, we have been recognized as one of the top schools in our state. This recognition is based on the school's strong SAT scores. This year's scores averaged at 1587. Ninety-two percent of our senior student class will be attending a four-year college or university. This represents a gain of twelve percent over the previous graduating class. We continue to take great pride in our academic rankings and performance-based recognitions. Moreover, we continue to be viewed as one of the top performing schools in the nation.

The fine arts programs in our school have received national acclaim. Creative writing and visual arts students have again been recognized in New York with top national awards from the Scholastic company. Ratings of "Superior" have been bestowed upon our students at nationally adjudicated band, orchestra, and vocal music competitions. Additionally, our student theatrical productions, dance performances, and piano recitals are magnificently presented and continue to endow our school with honors and awards.
