


PASS PERFORMANCE

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

With much uncertainty surrounding education in regard to budget issues, William Augustus Perry Middle School continues to focus on providing the best educational opportunities for its students. It is our intent to collaborate with all community stakeholders in an effort to prepare each student for a successful high school experience and to add to the foundation to facilitate lifelong learning.

W.A. Perry Middle School maintained its focus on achievement by continuing the momentum created in the 2009-2010 school year. During its fall and spring MAP administrations, W.A. Perry experienced increases on all grade levels in the measured subject areas of ELA and math. The school not only met academic goals set for the 2010-2011 school year, but W.A. Perry exceeded those goals while maintaining a student attendance rate above the South Carolina expectation of 94% and decreasing discipline referrals by 10%.

W.A. Perry also prides itself on providing opportunities for students to achieve in other content areas as well as co-curricular activities. Along with academic achievements in ELA and math, three W.A. Perry students won awards in the South Carolina's Region II Science Fair. Two of those awards included first place in the water award and the Columbia garden club award and the other award was "Best in 7th Grade" Top 10 Projects Award. In addition, five students won visual literacy awards in the 2010-2011 Visual Literacy Festival. By similar account, students excelled in the performing arts during 2010-2011. W.A. Perry had one student to earn first chair for the middle school bass clarinet in the district, 100% of band students passed the honor band auditions, and the drama department had one student accepted to the SC Governor's School Summer Program in theatre. Three students received first, second, and third place in the district's art show and an additional art student received the "Permanent Collection Award" which will allow the student's work to be displayed in the district office. In the athletic arena, student participation in athletics increased 40% and the boy's basketball team qualified for the playoffs.

While W.A. Perry, always W.A. solicits the assistance of parents and community members as partners, it is also important that we serve as a resource for our parents and community members. Our student body raised over \$1000 for the "Pennies for Patients" campaign and the student council partnered with Benedict College for "Campus Clean-up Day." One-hundred and three parents and community members enrolled in the "Parent University" general education development (GED) program provided at W.A. Perry through our 21st Century After-School Grant. Classes were also provided to parents and community members in the areas of career development and computer training. W.A. Perry hosted a number of curriculum nights for parents, a community reader's rally, and finally we utilized the Richland One mobile lab to assist our parents in accessing parent connect. We could not be successful without district support and the support of various partners that continue to provide opportunities for our students.
