


PLACEMENT RATE

REPORT OF DIRECTOR AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

During the 2011-2012 school year, Lee County Career & Technology Center (LCCTC) served 513 students unduplicated count from Lee Central High School, which is the only public high school in Lee County. LCCTC is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS).

LCCTC is committed to preparing the high school students of Lee County School District with skills and knowledge necessary to pursue a post-secondary education, or enter the workforce prepared and capable of being competitive in a global society. Programs offered to our students include: Automotive Technology, Cosmetology, Early Childhood, Teacher Cadet, Health Science, Electricity, Foods and Nutrition, Horticulture, Marketing, Business Management, Accounting, Welding and Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA).

LCCTC students are encouraged and given opportunities to participate in professional student organizations related to their area of study. Chapters of Health Occupation Students of America (HOSA), Future Farmers of America (FFA), Family, Career & Community Leaders of America (FCCLA), and Skills USA provide opportunities for leadership training and competition on a local, state, and national level. Several students competed on the state level in FFA and Skills USA.

LCCTC awarded the completer's certificate to 42 CATE students who completed four elective units in a program of study. Twelve students were inducted into the National Technical Honor Society (NTHS). LCCTC had eight students to earn the Certified Nursing Assistant certificate. All of the completers at LCCTC took the Work Keys assessment. More than 85% of the students scored at the Silver and Gold levels. 100% of the students in our Cosmetology program took and passed the SC State Board of Cosmetology exam.

The faculty and staff invite the community to visit the school to learn more about how career and technical education is an essential component of every high school student's educational experience. We are committed to finding ways for every student to have an opportunity to connect what they learn academically to their eventual career choice.
