Percent of Student PASS Records Matched for Purpose of Computing Growth Rating



District Superintendent's Report

Lexington One students and employees have a lot to share about our success during the 2011-2012 school year and the progress we continue to make on preparing a new generation of leaders and global citizens skilled in creativity, collaboration, critical thinking and communication. Our success stems from our "Schools of the Future – Now!" initiative, which ensures all students receive a personalized quality learning experience that pushes them to become self-directed learners.

A Quality Assurance Review team from the AdvancED accrediting agency recently evaluated our district and recommended that Lexington County School District One receive the highest level of accreditation. Our challenge is to make sure that our students are engaged in their own learning in every classroom in every school.

Many of our schools received Palmetto Gold and Silver awards for academic performance and for closing the achievement gap. Our schools also earned recognition for excellence in communications, guidance counseling, community service and more. Students won 11 state championships and multiple first-place awards at DECA, FBLA, FFA, HOSA and SkillsUSA state competitions. In 2011-2012, Lexington One was home to a Davidson Fellow; the top baseball, softball and football players in the state; the state's amateur athlete of the year, a first-place winner at the National Junior Science and Humanities Symposium; our state's Foreign Language Teacher of the Year, Early Childhood Administrator of the Year and Secondary Art Teacher of the Year; and many more talented students and employees.

At the beginning of 2011-2012, we opened four new Centers for Advanced Study where personalized learning experiences abound. This year, work continues on three more centers that will open for the 2013–2014 academic year.

Lexington One's personal mobile computing initiative provided our high school students and teachers with the 21st century tools they need to support their learning and teaching. With these devices, students acquire the digital competence they need for our increasingly electronic- and technology-driven world. Building on that success, the district expands the one-to-one initiative to middle schools in 2012–2013.

In the area of world language instruction, we continue to move toward our goal of having 75 percent of our graduates speaking more than one language by 2020. Our progress includes adding world language to the core curriculum at middle schools and adding Chinese (Mandarin) to our partial-immersion program and to languages offered in the upper grades.

It certainly is an exciting time to be a Lexington One student, employee, parent or community member. With your support and leadership, our combined efforts and dedication to excellence, caring and innovation continue to make this a place where children and learning are one.
