Percent of Student PASS Records Matched for Purpose of Computing Growth Rating



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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Bluffton Elementary and Early Childhood Center began the year with a newly developed mission and vision created by our staff. Our beliefs are that our students/staff will focus on academics through arts and technology. Part of our vision as well is fostering diversity by encouraging respect for and understanding of differing backgrounds and points of view. This is incorporated through our school-wide anti-bullying campaign and diversity quilts.

New things for the 2011-2012 school year:

- Facebook – BLES has developed our own Facebook page to provide more communication for parents.
- CSI overnight trip—Each year 5th Graders will be given an opportunity to attend a 3 day/2 night trip to Clemson University's CSI camp in Pickens County
- Animation Showcase—Larry King's "In View" series filmed a showcase about our animation program. This showcase will air on national television.
- Innovative Technology Award—the animation program won the Innovative Technology Award from the nationally recognized Arts School Network.
- PBIS—with Positive Behavior Intervention Strategies in full swing our students are now earning PRIDE bucks
- Parent Positives—Parents can send in positive comments about our staff. The comments are added to our website and staff members are recognized during the monthly staff meetings.
- A2—Advanced Academics for 2nd grade—with a high number of students performing extremely well at the end of 1st grade last year, we wanted to continue to help them excel. We created an A2 class for 2nd grade.

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ESEA/Federal Accountability Rating System

In July 2012, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
