Percent of Student PASS Records Matched for Purpose of Computing Growth Rating



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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

The support of Fair-Oak families, the community and a dedicated staff are the keys to the success of our students. As our school develops the cognitive, physical and emotional components of children’s lives, the number of third graders reading at or above grade level increases annually. Reading at or above grade level is crucial to their future of graduating from high school. We begin this goal for students when they enter our school as four or five year olds. As our teachers received intensive coaching on 100 Book Challenge, the reading stamina for all students increased. In addition, continuing the successful Sounds in Motion, a phonetic instructional strategy that combines movement to learning letters and sounds, our kindergarten and first grade students are better prepared for reading. This is evident in our spring reading Measuring Academic Progress and Observation Survey results. The Text Level on Observation Survey results clearly show our students’ progress as 70% first graders read on and above grade level. Our second grade spring MAP reading mean results rank the highest in the district, increasing by 5 points since 2010. Third grade students rank fourth highest in the district, on the reading MAP mean score, with higher results than district and national averages. It is evident these scores reveal our children are advancing in reading.

Combining a solid balanced reading initiative with high expectations for all subjects, the Fair-Oak staff received intensive training to implement the Bloom’s Revised Taxonomy with all students, particularly motivating children of poverty. Building background knowledge and vocabulary is boosting results and grades.

To enhance students’ emotional growth, the Positive Behavior Intervention team continued systems of positive rewards for following the R.A.C. E., R-(Respect) A-(Achieve) C- (Cooperate) E-(Eager to Learn) expectations. Students received daily mini lessons on the Chick Fil A Core Essentials and monthly incentives to purchase prizes at the school store and Victory lunches. Through the support of our PTO and families, our paved walking track extends physical activity opportunities for our students and their families before and after school. This collaborative effort of our community and our families builds the foundation for our students’ academic successes.

In July 2012, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
