**Percent of Student PASS Records Matched for Purpose of Computing Growth Rating**



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## Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Edisto Elementary School is a progressive and nurturing school located in a rural community in Orangeburg County, SC. Our mission, through the partnership of school, home, and community, is to create a caring, secure, and positive learning environment that produces imaginative, lifelong learners who will use high level thinking skills to become successful citizens in a culturally diverse society. Our curriculum uses the latest data-driven teaching strategies aligned to the SC State Standards while incorporating balance literacy across the curriculum as well as technology.

The purpose of Edisto Elementary School's educational program is to close the achievement gap by offering continuous improvement. In order to be successful, EES incorporates various types of classroom structures: team-teaching (regular classrooms, Cougar Magnet and LEAP classes), self-contained classes (3 special education/resource, 4 same-gender classes, 3 basic classes), and 4 related arts in conjunction with inclusion and mainstreaming.

It is through our ongoing attempt to close the academic gap that we received the Palmetto Silver Award for 2011-2012. Our warm and caring family atmosphere helped us obtain the outstanding award of a Red Carpet School in 2010-2011. Because of our strong belief in both the educational and socio-psychological development, we seek to instill the importance of a community by encouraging our students to participate in various clubs such as Good News Club, EES News Letter, Bike Club, Chorus, Math Club, Cubettes, Student Congress, and others. This past year we started a school-wide club in an endeavor to improve literacy. Every Tuesday, the students were grouped according to MAP scores. Each and every teacher taught Reading and Reading strategies to students during Book Club Tuesday.

In conjunction with the PTSO and the SIC, we participated in community services such as Box Tops 4 Education, Pop Tops, Relay for Life, and the "Cougar Closet and Paw Pantry," providing clothing and non-perishable food items to the members of the Edisto Community when needed. We also maintain a website for our community consisting of multiplicity information such as homework, belief statements, news articles, safety and health tips, library media information, lunch menus, and other pertinent information.

A variety of awards and services endorse learning achievements. Each quarter our SIC offered an incentive to students who excel academically while the administration and faculty offered celebrations for increasing MAP scores. At the same time we rewarded good behavior and good character. This past year, our guidance counselor added the Chick Filet Award monthly for good character.

The sole purpose of closing the academic gap is to equip students with the proper tools as they reach for the highest expectations in both school and life. This will be accomplished by academically improving all students through inclusion, Balance Literacy across the curriculum, and computer programs including the Academy of Reading, Accelerated Reader, Compass Learning, RTI, First in Math and others.

Through our open-door policy, we will continue to work collaboratively with the community for the success of each child.

In July 2012, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
