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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Fairfield Central High School, a rural school with approximately 815 students, serves students in grades nine through twelve who reside in Fairfield County. The composition of the student body is 93% African American, 4% Caucasian, and 3% Hispanic. The school is the only public high school in county and is dedicated to meeting the needs of all students. The faculty is dedicated to providing each student with the opportunity of achieving academic success. The faculty shares in the belief that our school should be a place where students enter to learn and depart to serve.

The school is diverse in the preparation of students for a global society. Students are provided with the opportunities to pursue a course of study that leads to success in the workforce or higher education. Students are encouraged to prepare for post- secondary education or vocational careers through the school's partnership with Fairfield County Career and Technology Center. The school has maintained steady growth and continues to show increases in language arts/reading and math scores on the High School Assessment Program (HSAP) assessment. Fairfield Central High School was presented with the Palmetto Silver Award for closing the achievement gap during the 2011-12 school year.

Fairfield Central High School continues to apply smart goals as a method of increasing student achievement. These goals include increasing the percentage of students meeting or exceeding standards in language arts/reading and math on HSAP, increasing the percentage of students passing End of Course (EOC) exams, and increasing the percentage of students meeting proficiency on district nine weeks assessments. Although Fairfield Central High considers academic achievement to be the area of the utmost importance, students are also encouraged to excel in extracurricular activities. We are extremely pleased that the graduating class of 2012 was awarded in excess of 2-million dollars in scholarships, and are equally happy about the successful seasons experienced by the varsity football team and the girls' varsity basketball team, as well as the many outstanding performances and accomplishments of our arts students. Fairfield Central High School continues to strive for excellence in academics, athletics, and the arts.

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ESEA/Federal Accountability Rating System

In July 2012, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
