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## Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Chapin High School has a proud tradition of excellence in academics, in athletics and in the arts. Serving over 1300 students, the key to this success is the strong partnership between the school and our community. We offer a diverse array of co-curricular activities, clubs and sports. The faculty and staff believe that when students are meaningfully involved with the school they will be successful. As a result of Chapin's commitment to reaching each student, we currently sponsor 42 clubs and organizations and 41 athletic sports, which provide multiple opportunities for all of our students to be successful. With over 65 percent of the student body participating in one or more sports, the South Carolina High School League has ranked our school 3rd in AAA classification for the Athletic Directors Cup.

We are certainly proud to be recognized by U. S. News and World Report and Newsweek Magazine as one of America's Best High Schools. We were awarded the prestigious Palmetto Gold Award for academic excellence and Palmetto Silver for closing the achievement gap. Chapin High's SAT scores exceeded the National average and ranked first in the Midlands. Our four year graduation rate of 94.5%, the highest in the Midlands, is a result of the Chapin High School faculty and staff's commitment to maximizing the potential of each student. As a result of this commitment, the End-of-Course passage rates were among the top ten in the State. Chapin High has an Academic Leadership Academy that promotes the ideals of scholarship and leadership. Students in this academy will take Advanced Placement classes while they develop leadership skills that prepare them to make an impact in the 21st Century. Chapin High administered over 779 Advanced Placement exams and our goal is to increase the number of students participating in the Advanced Placement courses of study. At Chapin, we recognize that many students fall into the dimension of "at-risk" for not reaching their potential. Therefore, we have the SAIL (Success Acquired in Learning) program to provide assistance for all "at-risk" students.

In the 2011-2012 school year, Chapin High Schools student body truly exemplified Eagle Pride. Our Student Government played a pivotal part in promoting our school spirit and helped to raise thousands of dollars for community service projects. The Department of the Navy evaluated over 600 programs across the country and Chapin High School's NJROTC was selected as the 2012 Navy League Most Outstanding (BEST) Unit. Chapin also provided multiple opportunities for students in the Performing Arts, which include chorus, orchestra, visual arts, band, dance and drama. Our chorus and band programs are literally the "Pride of the Midlands" due to their numerous Superior ratings. This year our Marching Band was named Lower State Champions and they placed 4th overall in the State. Thirteen students were selected to the All-State Chorus, and four students were selected to the All-State Orchestra. The Chapin High School athletic department continued in its excellence by being consistently rated the best in the Midlands. Our cheerleaders have won more state championships than any program and this year they added an unprecedented eight state titles to their amazing record. The CHS men's tennis team also won the state title for the third consecutive year. We are proud of our students and their successes.

In July 2012, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
