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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

McCormick High School addressed the physical and organizational structure of the school during the 2012-12 year. The aesthetics, bell schedule, and traffic procedures were addressed to enhance the school culture. Faculty and staff utilized the Spring Board Curriculum to deliver an instructional setting of rigor. Students were engaged in critical thinking and problem-solving lessons that promoted college and career readiness.

Professional development opportunities were provided to staff throughout the school year to enhance their skills and understanding of the curriculum. Teacher teams conducted departmental meetings that promoted student achievement, vertical alignment and cross-curricular emphasis.

Academic programs were established to provide support to our students such as ZAP (Zeros Aren't Permitted) during the school day, and SCI (Supplemental Core Instruction) and SAT/ACT Prep after school. Enrichment opportunities were provided via after-school clubs as well. With the presence of MHS academic initiatives and curriculum, MHS students showed positive signs toward academic success and many were recognized for their performance in the classroom during quarterly academic recognition programs.

MHS worked to incorporate measures to promote PBIS. Faculty and staff were given additional training in the implementation of the program. Faculty and staff will continue to receive training to ensure that PBIS is implemented effectively to promote a PBIS school.

MHS extracurricular programs were implemented to ensure students enjoyed success in academics, character, sportsmanship, and competitiveness. This is characteristic of a successful program. We are proud of the recognition our boys and girls basketball teams received as region champions. Our football team had a playoff appearance and playoff win. These are examples of the work that will continue to inspire and challenge our students.

Parents were extended an opportunity to participate in their child's schooling through open house programs, the PTA and School Improvement Council. Parent attendance and support continued to be evident during various co-curricular programs, parent conference days and extracurricular activities.

In July 2012, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
