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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

During the 2011-2012 school year our mantra was "Great Things and Great People Come from Lower Richland High School." This mantra was evidenced by the success of our students in the classroom, their success in extracurricular activities and the improvement of established programs. Lower Richland High School was awarded a \$6 million School Improvement Grant focused around improving Mathematics and English results through infusing a Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) focus. Our STEM focus allows students to develop career goals in conjunction with our High Schools that Works initiative (HSTW). Academically, Lower Richard High School is an IB World School offering the IB Diploma Programme. It is now also a candidate school for the IB Career-related Certificate. IB World Schools share a common philosophy—a commitment to high-quality, challenging, international education—that we believe is important for our students. IB students and students in our Advanced Placement classes can gain credit for college through these courses of study.

Lower Richland promotes literacy throughout the school in conjunction with district and HSTW requirements. Lower Richland is a member of the College Summit consortium, a group of schools committed to increasing college attendance. This year we had our 2nd College Application Day where all seniors applied to at least one college or university. Colleges and Universities from around South Carolina assisted our students with applications and some students were even admitted on site. We are delighted to announce that our graduates received over 5 million dollars in scholarships.

Students at Lower Richland High School are attached to the local community through numerous service opportunities. Our cheerleaders, Teacher Cadets, Student Government leaders and JROTC participated in numerous community service activities at many different venues. Our JROTC won the Superintendent's Cup award for the #1 unit in Richland County School District One.

Lower Richland students excel in the area of extra-curricular activities with several teams winning Region V 3A Championships. Lower Richland CATE students hold state offices in Skills USA, HOSA and FCCLA and attend national conferences. Lower Richland High School received an excellent rating in the area of Foreign Language and also received the PBIS Banner Award for effectively implementing Positive Behavior Intervention and Support strategies on campus.

Lower Richland's PTSA received the district's Volunteer Group of the Year Award. We offer parent workshops, ministerial meetings, and meetings with business partners. Grandparents Day and Diamond Festival are held to promote community involvement. PTSA sponsors scholarships for student members while School Improvement Council provides assistance to the administration in outlining school goals and our Booster Clubs provide additional financial support for student activities.

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ESEA/Federal Accountability Rating System

In July 2012, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
