Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

James F. Byrnes Freshman Academy is an awesome school! James F. Byrnes Freshman Academy students were very productive this year, working not only in the classrooms, but in the community as well. In addition to excelling in the academic and sports arenas, students showed their "Rebel Pride" by participating in Relay for Life, the Middle Tyger Community Center food drive, the Middle Tyger Community Center Purses with Purpose, the prom dress collection, the March of Dimes walk, Storybook Christmas, and countless other local community projects that needed the assistance of our youth. This year, Byrnes Freshman Academy hosted our Third Annual FCA 5k at Willow Creek, and were the winners of the event with the most participants! Many of our students were active participants in Fine Arts productions, including drama, orchestra and choral concerts. Our band travelled to Hawaii over the Winter Break, where they performed on the USS Arizona. Athletics are also a big draw in our district, and this year was not an exception. Many of our students were members of the undefeated C-team and state championship football team! Several of our students were also involved in the state baseball championship, where we completed the season as the runners-up for Division IV. ROTC provided students with another opportunity for extracurricular activity, with many students attending leadership trips to Virginia and to Ohio. Our teachers were active learners as well this year, attending conferences to learn about the Common Core standards that will be adopted by our state. Using technology and differentiated instruction, our faculty has worked diligently to employ procedures to engage all students. As a High Schools That Works (HSTW) site, we have developed many strategies to engage freshmen, including Orientation Day, single-gender classes, RD Anderson field trips to partner with our vocational center, and a College/Career Day that highlights careers/college opportunities, strategies classes for struggling students, and intervention plans to identify and mentor our at-risk population. Community involvement has been beneficial to us in developing/implementing both our character education and literacy initiative. We hope to continue to ensure the success of all of our students each and every day.
