Percent of Student PASS Records Matched for Purpose of Computing Growth Rating



Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

At Guinyard-Butler, we recognize that middle level students experience great changes intellectually, socially, emotionally, and physically during the years between elementary and high school. We have dedicated, caring, staff members that are committed to help students successfully transition through these years. We offer many programs and services to meet the unique needs of young adolescent learners. Since middle school is a time of growth and exploration, students actively participate in activity classes to discover their interests. The school offers several programs during the school day including computer/keyboarding, art, music, band, and physical education. There are multiple extra-curricular and co-curricular offerings for students, as well. Email and the Parent Portal sites are available for students and parents to help increase communication between home and school regarding student progress. Below is a list of some of the improvement efforts initiated by the GBMS Faculty:

Continued to implement the Barnwell 45 Curriculum; Continued with our Single Gender program in 7th grade; Sponsored Meet and Greet before school started; Held Fall and Winter Open House; Sponsored Art and Spaghetti Night; Held School Improvement Council meetings; Developed and Utilized Quarterly Common Benchmark Assessments; Attended the 90-90-90 Summit; Created Data Room to analyze student achievement; Began training for Common Core Standards transition; Applied for and received several educational grants, such as "Champions of the Environment;" Held an Eighth Grade Science Fair; Monthly newsletters sent home.

As result of the faculty's and staff's dedication to improvement, the students of GBMS were afforded the opportunity to or accomplish the goals listed below:

13 Junior Scholars students. An Art class was offered this year to all students. Jr. Beta Club activities and projects included: attending the Jr. Beta Club convention in Myrtle Beach, operating the concession stand for home basketball games and inducted 33 new members. Students participated in the Lt. Governor's Essay Contest and Soil and Water Conservation Essay Contest. Student Council activities and projects included: 1) Honoring teachers during Teacher Appreciation Week and American Education Week, 2) Entering the Homecoming Parade, 3) Sponsoring the Miss GBMS Pageant, and 4) working on GBMS Beautification, 5) coordinating Red Ribbon Week and Spirit Week. Students and staff participate in Pennies for Patients. Excellent athletic seasons in which many students participated in middle school and high school level sports. Band program which served approximately 28 students. School-wide spelling bee was held. School winner participated in the Regional Spelling Bee in Allendale, SC and moved on to the National Spelling Bee in Washington, DC. 8th grade students participated in the Science Fair. School winners participated in the regional Science Fair in Aiken, SC. Charity Talent Show was held to raise money for needy families within our community. Warpony Pride Passes were given out for good behavior, good grades, and good citizenship. Pride Pass Parties were held each 9 weeks for students who earned enough to attend.

In July 2012, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target.
