Percent of Student PASS Records Matched for Purpose of Computing Growth Rating



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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Cainhoy Elementary/Middle School continues its commitment to raising student achievement through strong academics and dynamic engaging programs. The implementation of school improvement has shown marked improvements in the areas of curriculum and student achievement.

The faculty continues to examine student achievement gains and the curriculum in the areas of reading, writing, math concepts, critical thinking and assessments.

Some of our accomplishments in 2011-2012 include: 6 students passing the algebra 1 and English 1 exam, 2 students finished second in the ELA portion of the BCSD Quiz Bowl, 8 All County Chorus Participants, the Palmetto Silver Award, 3rd place in the "Kids Who Care Program," and the continuation of our recycling program.

We continue to promote the use of technology with our computer lab "ASSIST" program. We have continued with the Tiger Cafe to encourage students to participate in our Accelerated Reading Program. Another incentive to learn is through the use of Tiger Bucks. Students use these to purchase materials such as pencils, pens, paper, games, and other items from the Tiger Pride Store.

Our PTO and SIC continue to provide classroom supplies throughout the school year. They work very hard to support students, teachers, and staff to enhance student achievement.

We will continue to improve our school's overall rating with a coordinated team effort of district leaders, administrators, teachers, students, parents, and a strong SIC and PTO.

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ESEA/Federal Accountability Rating System

In July 2012, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
