**Percent of Student PASS Records Matched for Purpose of Computing Growth Rating**



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## Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

During the 2012-2013 school year, we continued our focus for professional development on best practices and developing 21st century learners.

Midway Elementary School's PTO funded professional development that focused on restructuring our learning environments in order to decrease student distractions and increase student focus on learning. Professional development continued to explore and teach new strategies for movement and engagement of learners, while adding 21st Century Skills for Global Citizens. Professional development also allowed our teachers the opportunity to explore Common Core State Standards' depth of questioning as we prepare for transitioning to those standards.

Our PTO continued to fund student field trips, while the SIC continued our work on improving the cafeteria. The improvements included an additional control panel for the sound system and new risers for performances. Through the support of our SIC and PTO, our special needs playground received a shade structure over the equipment so that students can safely spend more time outside.

We continued to focus on developing student leaders with programs such as our Recycling Team and A.M. Show Crew. In addition, we sponsored our first Student Council with members elected by students. This group of students organized and led our student body in activities such as Hat Day to raise donations for the student-selected service project of Relay For Life for the American Cancer Society.

MES's technological capabilities continued to grow, as the district provided each grade level with a set of 15 iPads which, along with our computer labs, wireless laptop cart and iPad class set in the Learning Commons, made technology more accessible and visible. Our goals continue to focus on developing technology with students honing their technological skills while doing relevant and meaningful work. The challenge with technology will continue to be the funding as well as the training in the ever-changing world of electronics. Complementing our technology is the development of our Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) instruction with the addition of two STEM labs. These labs also assist us in our academic focus of increasing the number of students who score "Exemplary" on our Science state assessment.

Our Partial-Immersion French program continues to flourish and is well established in each grade level. This stability allows us to refine and develop curriculum structured to deepen students' experiences. The lack of translated resources is an ongoing barrier in providing readily available instructional materials for students.

Communication with our community continues to grow. We now send home weekly school/class newsletters as well as multiple school messages through our automated telephone/email system. With this strong sense of community comes celebration. For the 12th year, MES received a Palmetto Gold Award for academic achievement and, for the first time, the Palmetto Silver Award for closing the achievement gap.

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## ESEA/Federal Accountability Rating System

In July 2013, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
