


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## REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

This has been a year of significant growth and accomplishment at Richland Northeast High School. We now join over 4000 school in 143 countries with the designation as an International Baccalaureate World School for the IB Diploma, and our first cohort of students began the internationally recognized and rigorous IB Diploma Programme. To reach even more students, we instituted a project-based learning program, iDesign, with the freshman class. These students will continue their education through hand-on and real-world learning as we move the program forward into grade ten. Our CATE programs were also expanded during the 2012-2013 school year with the expansion of our Health Sciences program and the addition of Culinary Arts. The Richland Northeast Café with now offer tasty treats created by our emerging chefs.

During the 2011-2012 school year, we worked to strengthen our School Improvement Council. These efforts began to pay off this year and the school was recognized statewide for excellence and awarded the Dick and Tunky Riley SIC Award. The SIC continues to work on the rebranding effort and continues to tout the positive nature of Richland Northeast High School to the community. To this end, the first annual Spring Fling was held in April. The event attracted many throughout the community by offering multiple athletic games, a carnival, and a showcase of Richland Northeast talent.

The NJROTC continued its tradition of excellence during the 2012-2013 school year, winning competitions at both the state and regional levels. Also continuing to shine, the Model United Nations team placed first at the Southern United States MUN Conference and the National MUN Conference. Because of all of the achievements of both faculty members, parents, and students, WACH FOX 57 featured Richland Northeast High School in a morning broadcast from campus.

We were excited to have five students score a perfect score on a component of the SAT or ACT this year. We had numerous students earn the Palmetto Fellow Early award, guaranteeing scholarships to state colleges. Overall, Richland Northeast High School students earned over \$12,489,430.00 dollars in college scholarship. Additionally, we had one National Merit Finalist this year. We continue to stress community service at Richland Northeast. Again this year we adopted more families than any other school in the Midlands for Families Helping Families. We were also able to surpass our goal of raising 20,000 canned goods, which will benefit many in surrounding communities. Through our HOPE 365 initiative, students took on goals of charitable giving throughout the school year, and the results were astounding.

As I look back at the accomplishments of 2012-2013, I am simply overwhelmed with pride for my Cavalier Family. I appreciate the opportunity to continue to work towards improving our school, and I am honored to have had the chance to lead this outstanding high school. As always, it is great to be at RNE!
