Percent of Student PASS Records Matched for Purpose of Computing Growth Rating



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Report of Principal and School Improvement Council

Energized and Ready to Soar – This was the prevalent theme at Clover Middle School throughout the 2012-13 school year.

A high EOC passage rate, 21 Junior Scholars, as well as award-winning LEGO Robotics and MathCounts teams, are a few examples of CMS's academic accolades. Additional academic support through the efforts of SOAR classes, working lunches, a re-vamped morning program, expanded teacher tutoring opportunities, as well as National Junior Honor Society-sponsored before-school peer tutoring is available for those in need. With the onset of Common Core State Standards, project-based learning has made its way to CMS as evidenced by newly re-landscaped median beds in front of our school. From start to finish, all phases of this project from planning to planting were student-directed and teacher-facilitated.

While academics are a primary focus, CMS focuses on the total child. Administration instituted a High Flyer recognition initiative, whereby teachers recommend students for positive contributions to the school climate. We continue to improve our communication efforts by adding automated texting and regular email notification of school events as well as displaying messages on our new digital marquee. Initiatives such as our Seeing Blue Eagles Soar events, rising 6th grade tours and parent meetings and a meet-the-teacher night and registration day devoted solely to 6th graders are a few of the efforts upon which CMS embarks to foster the transition from elementary to middle school. Expanded IGP prep and awareness and a revamped tour of Clover High School paved the way to better prepare our eighth grade for the move to high school. Additionally, our fine arts program continues to thrive, with 7th and 8th grade bands receiving superior ratings at the annual concert festival. The CMS choral program returned to the spotlight this year, as it was rated as one of the top ten middle level choruses in the state!

Community partnerships, most notably through our expanded job shadowing initiative and the continued expansion of the Gloria Reid Garden, are important parts of Clover Middle School life. This year, construction of a gazebo area to be utilized as an outdoor covered classroom area has begun in the garden area. Our parent group, PALs (Parents As Leaders) continues to thrive and support our students and teachers. Their fund-raising efforts provide opportunities for student recognition and reward.

Together, our students, teachers, administrators, parents and the community work to maintain an environment in which all students are provided every opportunity to learn and grow. We are energized and soaring!

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ESEA/Federal Accountability Rating System

In July 2013, the South Carolina Department of Education was granted a waiver from several accountability requirements of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA). This waiver allowed SC to replace the former pass/fail system with one that utilizes more of the statewide assessments already in place and combine these subject area results with graduation rate (in high schools) to determine if each school met the target or made progress toward the target. This analysis results in a letter grade for the school rather than the pass/fail system of previous years.
