

District Superintendent's Report

Lexington School District Three continued progress toward our district strategic goals for improving student achievement. The District partnered with the SC STEM Center to provide professional development to K-12 teachers to support the full implementation of SC State Standards with rigor, collaboration, and engagement. Technology learning sessions were offered throughout the year for teachers to more effectively use available technology in the classrooms on a daily basis. Additionally, literacy initiatives continued across the district to better prepare students for reading, writing, and communication in the 21st Century workplace.

Batesburg-Leesville Primary School completed expansion of the K4 program to serve 100 students across five K4 classes. The K4 program received full licensure through the State Department of Education's Child Development Education Pilot Program (CDEPP) and Department of Social Services (DSS). Lexington District Three also strengthened our partnership with Midlands Technical College with the opening of the College and Career Development Center (CCDC) at Batesburg-Leesville High School. The CCDC is one of two centers operated at a high school by Midlands Technical College and offers students, parents, and community members with invaluable resources and support for college and career readiness.

Batesburg-Leesville Middle School received a Palmetto Silver Award for Closing the Achievement Gap. Batesburg-Leesville High School received the Palmetto Gold Award for Student Performance. The Batesburg-Leesville High School Class of 2014 also had over \$2 million in scholarship awards, with 89% of the graduating class planning to attend a two or four year college.

Our students and staff were recognized in sports and co-curricular activities including awards for FFA competitions, Special Olympics, SC Honors Choir, and the Outstanding Performance Award by the Batesburg-Leesville High School Band. Also, the B-L Panther Band earned second place in the State 1A Championship. In athletics, our teams continued to compete in region play with the BL Panthers winning the 2A State Championship Football crown!

Thank you for your continued support of our district. We are very proud of our students, teachers, and staff for their achievements this year. Working together, we can continue to prepare students for the future...now.
