**Report of Principal and School**

Hilton Head Island High School reached many lofty goals in 2013-2014. For the third year in a row, we earned an Excellent - Excellent rating on our state report card. We have earned a Gold rating for the second consecutive year as well. Our International Baccalaureate Middle Years and Diploma Programs continued to thrive with a record fifty-five rising juniors joining the Diploma Program for the fall 2014 semester. Our student population continues to become widely diverse with students representing twenty-nine countries. We are sending a student to the International Science and Engineering Fair in Los Angeles, CA this year. She was Best in Show for the High School level; one of the grand prize winners at the Sea Island Regional Science Fair, which qualified her to compete at the ISEF. Social Studies Department Chair, Duncan Aspinwall-Winter, was awarded the DAR Outstanding Teacher of American History in South Carolina, Raychelle Lohmann was named SC Counselor of the Year, and Joseph Monmonier was awarded the AAA Region 8 Athletic Director of the Year. Three staff members were National Board recertified, and Jamie Reichelt received her National Board Certification. Two staff members earned their master’s degrees and one staff member, Angie Williams, earned her doctorate degree. . Academically speaking, we were proud to have had the opportunity to display the many talents of our students and faculty. As always, students who struggle continued to find support from many organizations at Hilton Head Island High School. Our faculty worked to support preferential course scheduling for many ninth and tenth grade classes, free tutoring both on campus and in targeted neighborhood locations, and mentoring opportunities through organizations such as Girl Power and the Gentleman’s Club, whose goals include supporting young people in all areas of their lives while in high school. We know these programs were successful on many levels, particularly with helping students stay focused on academic achievement and high-stakes tests like HSAP and EOCE. Athletics and extra-curricular activities have always been exceptional at HHIHS, and that tradition continued in 2013-2014. State athletic championships in girls’ swimming, boys’ and girls’ cross country, soccer, track, tennis, as well as 12 region championship teams and numerous student athletic accomplishments led to eleven signings for HHIHS athletes to play at the collegiate level over the national average. We also took home the AAA Region 8 Sportsmanship, Ethics and Integrity Award. Our Navy Junior ROTC earned the title "Distinguished Unit with Academic Honors" status by placing in the top 10% of all NJROTC units nationwide. We are ranked 5th of 65 units in Area Six (North and South Carolina), up from 8th last year and 11th in 2012. We competed at the NJROTC Orienteering National Championship and are ranked 10th in the nation. Additionally, we had our strongest Annual Military Inspection results ever, with an overall result of DISTINGUISHED. Our unit has grown from 134 in 2012/13 to over 200 this school year. Two student musicians were named as All-State Orchestra members, additionally; three students made region orchestra and four students were named Region Band members. Students in our Visual Arts Department continued to excel with both Kurtzberg and Photographic Society of America winners. Out of thirteen applicants for a Scholastic Media Arts Award, eleven were awarded. The Hilton Head Island High School Community is proud to have continued the multi-faceted tradition of excellence throughout the 2013 – 2014 school year.






### Reading - Grade 4 (2013)




### Mathematics - Grade 4 (2013)
