## Report of Principal and School

As we continue to strive for excellence, the Columbia High School staff and community are committed to the work of providing our students with the best learning environment filled with a challenging curriculum designed to empower our students to achieve and gain success.

Our STEM Academies remain at the center of our school programming to ensure that our students experience real-world situations to prepare them for life and career paths beyond high school. During 2013-14, students in the Engineering, Finance, Health Science, Biomedical Science and upper level Math courses, have been provided with many hands-on activities to include: health science clinical, field studies and job shadowing and internships in Finance, and career-oriented guest speakers and programs in Biomedical Science with persons currently working in the field. The partnerships with Palmetto Health and local pharmacies have proven to be successful and meaningful to our students. In addition, the Engineering students participate in extended learning with the USC Lecture Series, the Bridge Building and Trebuchet Contest, and are currently working with the Richland One District Engineers to develop a Pedestrian Safety Improvement Plan for Columbia High. We are very proud of the partnerships that continue to grow and provide so much support and assistance to our student body.

Columbia High School provides students and staff several opportunities to use technology during instructional delivery and classroom assignments and projects. We saw an increased use of the smart boards for student-centered activities, engaging lessons with the iPod lab, and more videoconferencing in many classes ranging from Advanced Placement English, to Teacher Cadet, to Physical Education.

During the 2012-13 school year, we saw increases in the passage rate for all EOC courses, Advanced Placement courses, improvements with HSAP, and solid increases with ACT and SAT for college admissions. In an effort to encourage and strive for continued success in these areas, and maintain solid instruction and sufficient test preparation, we included additional enrichment sessions during the school day for 2013-14. Also, students were scheduled to additional academic classes for EOC and HSAP preparation in English and Math to allow students to receive assistance daily in lieu of an alternating schedule.

We expanded the services offered through our 21st Century Community Learning Center grant to work on literacy development with 9th and now 10th graders.

There were also several notable performances in AFJROTC, wrestling, soccer, baseball, Fine Arts, Student Council, and other co-curricular organizations.

We will continue to work hard to provide our students with the best possible opportunities educationally to help them achieve their potential and dreams.
