




#### READING - GRADE 8 (2013)

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**REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL**

Conway High School had a successful year implementing programmatic initiatives that met the needs of its dynamic student population. School leadership teams involving students and faculty are active in discussing and addressing the important educational issues to further improve the school's learning community. The SIC met its goals of focusing on improving student achievement while pursuing a framework designed to increase student voice and assist students to reach their aspirations.

Community members and educators in the Conway Cluster adopted The Quaglia framework to bring eight conditions into school practice proven to enhance goal orientation and student confidence. The new framework calls for both student and teacher led groups to play leadership roles that support the mature development of area youth.

Conway High's second AVID cohort graduated in 2014 with more than 85% of the graduates accepted into post secondary colleges and universities, while our fine arts department continued its remarkable success in placing students in all-county choir and receiving All State honors.

The Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS) program continues to reward hundreds of students for positive choices as well as supports grade level assemblies twice per year. Seniors receive a special awards program at the close of the year and a Class Tea sponsored by the Junior Marshals.

Our FFA efforts lead to state competition and earned the Bronze Chapter Award from the South Carolina association. The FFA continued its tradition of participating in Legislation Appreciation Day receiving recognition from both the House and Senate.

Our athletic teams provided exciting play and had strong finishes in competitive cheer, volleyball, basketball, wrestling, softball, and girls' & boys' track and field. CHS had lower state qualifiers in both boys' and girls' track & field. A CHS baseball player was selected in the first round off the MLB draft.

The Conway High School tradition of philanthropy showed its strength hosting an inter club Rivertown Christmas program, two incredibly successful fundraising events for students experiencing serious health challenges. These events demonstrate heightened student awareness and a deep spirit of compassion.
