


## SC PASS PERFORMANCE

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**REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL**

During the past school year Southeast Middle School continued to proudly provide a positive, engaging middle level learning environment. We were laser focused this year on becoming a truly student-centered school. We began the year with detailed professional development on how to implement a project based learning curriculum (PBL). The ongoing professional development and support provided to all teachers led to the implementation of well-developed PBLs in all content and related arts classes. This initiative was well received by both faculty and students and with a little practice will become a major component of the curriculum.

The disappointment shared by staff, students and parents in the 2013 PASS results catapulted the entire Southeast family into carefully reviewing our data and instructional practices. The detailed data analysis led us to revisiting our intervention and support practices. All methods of intervention were reviewed and several measures were taken. We now offer intervention and support during early bird, an intervention block, during related arts, after-school and on Saturdays. Parents and students are well aware of how and when to ask for assistance. Student's attendance in after-school programs have increased and we have added staff to all intervention programs to meet the needs of the growing enrollment.

Southeast Middle School has a short history, but one rich in athletic achievement and a successful fine arts program. The 2013 school year has been no different. Our girls' basketball team rallied back from a tough season to be named district champions. Our football team celebrated a 7-0 winning season. They are proud to boast a district championship as well. In the fine arts department our chorus, band and orchestra have earned several district and regional awards. All three programs traveled out of the state to perform in musical competitions. We had several district level honorees in the visual arts class and several pieces were chosen to be displayed in local businesses in the city.

The entire Southeast community has worked hard to make necessary improvements in the learning environment we provide for our students. Through our research and conversations with other educational leaders, we have decided to embark on a new venture. It is with the support of our Superintendent and Board of School Commissioners we are now in the consideration phase of becoming an International Baccalaureate Middle Years Program (IB MYP) school. I along with lead teachers in every content area have begun the training process and it is our goal to apply for candidacy during the 2014-2015 school year. We are confident that if we are successful in earning the distinction of becoming an IB MYP school, academic success will be eminent.
