


## SC PASS PERFORMANCE

**REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL**

Our pride is showing at McCarthy Teszler School. We named our 2013-2014 Teacher of the Year and she has served as a consistent member of our school Leadership Team. The purpose of this team is identifying areas for improvement within our school, serving as a liaison among staff, and developing an improvement plan. Our Leadership Team continues to lead our staff in professional development, to promote a positive school climate, and to oversee the implementation of our school action plan. Academically, we continue to enhance the use of our curriculum Unique Learning System, a standards-based curriculum program designed specifically for students with significant cognitive, communication, physical, and/or sensory disabilities. Technology continues to be a priority in instruction and in communication with the advancement of our curriculum. We have benefited greatly from a two year school-wide initiative to have I Pads available for instructional use throughout our school and county wide programs. Over the past two years our technology inventory has increased with the addition of 115 I Pads which have been graciously donated by numerous local school organizations, and Spartanburg County businesses and organizations. We have greatly benefited from the continuous community partnerships. Additionally, the Spartanburg County Medical Society and Alliance has joined our team of community support that will assist us in enhancing our technology and communication initiatives to serve students from Spartanburg County. The Spartanburg Civitans provided a multi-media presentation system to enhance the delivery of instruction with students and information to our staff. Communication needs of students continue to be a high priority in classrooms with the school wide goal of every student to have access to a low tech or high tech communication system. Equipment that fosters communication by our students and allows them to produce language and give a voice to those who are nonverbal is a priority. Our school has continued this year to host Autism trainings for Spartanburg and surrounding county educators and family members of individuals with spectrum disorders. In order to continue addressing the diverse needs of students on the Autism spectrum we have partnered with Converse College to develop a five course graduate program. This program will focus on researched based instruction and interventions for students with Autism. This summer at the 2014 National Special Olympics in New Jersey our school was very proud to have supported the participation of two athletes. The two athletes combined achieved a bronze medal on beam, a silver medal on vault, silver medal on floor, bronze medal for all around, and a silver medal in the singles bocce. Teachers are advancing their craft, and supporting their instruction by writing and receiving grants. Our school year culminated with the graduating of eleven graduates to post graduate programs. We are looking ahead to a new year of endeavors that will provide excellent instructional and therapeutic programming for our students.
