


SC PASS PERFORMANCE

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL AND SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT COUNCIL

Youth Leadership Academy's second year of operation proved to be a successful one. Students showed improvements academically, physically and socially.

Academically, improvements were measured with both MAP and PASS scores and showed our students making above-average gains, particularly in Math. During the year, students and staff participated in Math Blitz sessions on Friday afternoons for 12 weeks, and the results show that all the hard work was worth it!

For the first time, YLA offered high school credits to our first eighth grade class, and all eighth graders left YLA with one or more Carnegie units. Algebra I and Honors Algebra I were offered to 17 of our 22 eighth graders, and all students passed the End of Course Algebra test. Honors English I was also offered to qualifying students, all of whom passed the EOC.

Fifty-six charter members were inducted into the YLA Junior Beta Club, and we look forward to an active club membership in the coming year.

Students made gains physically through daily opportunities for physical activity and the addition of a Running Club. Many students and their family members participated in 5K events throughout the school year.

Once again, our students showed concern for those less fortunate in the community by raising an astonishing annual total of \$6,000+ to give to worthy charitable organizations. Our eighth graders participated in the Can Do Good project and won third place in the Southeast with their replica of Clemson's Death Valley, created entirely of canned goods and non-perishable food items, all of which were donated to United Christian Ministries to help feed the hungry in our community. In lieu of a formal field day, students hosted a Run-a-Thon on the last day of school to raise money to help the family of a 4-year old child stricken with cancer, and raised over \$4,000.

Our PTO was very active during the school year, and the vast majority of money raised was given back to the students to help with field trip expenses. The Leopards on the Links Golf Tournament was a huge success, and everyone is already looking forward to next year's event.

Students ended the year with Celebration Field Trips to Charleston (6th grade), Atlanta (7th grade) and DisneyWorld (8th grade). We again experienced delays in our building program, but staff and students worked through the situation with patience and determination. We look forward to entering our newly approved classrooms in the 2014-15 school year!
