

Our district is helping all students develop the world class skills and life and career characteristics of the Profile of the South Carolina Graduate by maintaining an emphasis on reading achievement, focusing on college and career ready standards, and ensuring that teachers and other stakeholders continually play a vital role in our collaborative approach to curriculum development. In Aiken County Public Schools, we value the collective knowledge, expertise, and experience of our staff. Through Professional Learning Communities (PLCs) we model world class skills and characteristics while analyzing data, designing instruction, and planning for intervention. At every level, we provide students with opportunities to collaborate, think critically and creatively, and communicate in a variety of ways and to multiple audiences. These opportunities are given in the context of rigorous instruction designed to help all students achieve at high levels while practicing perseverance and developing interpersonal skills. Working closely with our local colleges, we are preparing students for post high school success by increasing numbers in dual-enrollment and concurrent enrollment courses. Successful partnerships include Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) institutes and science standards institutes with Ruth Patrick Science Education Center; Professional Development Schools with USC Aiken; Pre-engineering Academy with Aiken Technical College; the flagship apprentice program with MTU, and Young Entrepreneurs Academy with the Greater Aiken Chamber of Commerce. New and exciting partnerships include Education and Employment (E2) Promise with Aiken County United Way and our Twenty-first Century Learning Environments with Microsoft. All of these endeavors provide students with opportunities to gain the world class knowledge, characteristics and skills to be successful at each level and after leaving our schools. Initiatives designed to enrich the instructional experience for all students and target the specific needs of struggling students include, Reading Recovery in elementary schools, STEM emphasis and Making Middle Grades Work in middle schools, and High Schools that Work in our high schools. Teachers at all levels design formative assessment to identify individual and group needs and use PLCs to determine and implement strategies to address those needs. With the shared vision of academic success, our communities and Aiken County Public Schools will surpass previous goals and set the achievement bar even higher during the 2015-16 school year.

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


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




Districts with Students Like Ours are districts with poverty indices of no more than 5% above or below the index for the district.

**The ACT**, a college readiness assessment, was given to every South Carolina 11th grader in 2015 with the exception of those eligible for alternate assessments. The ACT scores range from 0 to 36. The district and state averages are included for comparison. State averages for ACT data are based on regular public schools and do not include private schools in the state.

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
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**KNOWLEDGE**

ACT WorkKeys is a job skills assessment system measuring "real world" skills that employers believe are critical in the workplace. The assessment is given to every South Carolina 11th grader with the exception of those eligible for alternative assessments. The assessment consists of three subtests: Applied Mathematics, Reading for Information, and Locating Information. Students can earn certificates at the Platinum, Gold, Silver, and Bronze level on WorkKeys assessments.
